He ignored the environmental problems and pollution from which China suffers as it rushes to become an industrial superpower. He ignored the recent terrorist attack which killed sixteen policemen, as well as the terrorist's threat to target "the most critical point of the Olympics." He ignored human rights abuses and the strict restrictions China has placed on the media.
